## **Applications Open August 1 for Prestigious NREF Fellowships**

**ROLLING MEADOWS, Ill. (July 27, 2016)** — The Neurosurgery Research and Education Foundation (NREF) is pleased to announce that grant applications for two prestigious awards will open next month on the NREF's Online Grant Portal: the Post-Residency Clinical Fellowship and the William P. Van Wagenen Fellowship.

Awarded annually since 1968, the **William P. Van Wagenen Fellowship** is offered for post-residency study in a foreign country for a period of 12 months. The Van Wagenen Fellowship was designed to provide freedom in scientific development without the restrictive limitations usually imposed by many research grants and fellowships.

To allow more flexibility and planning time for both residents and their institutions of employment, the NREF will be accepting Van Wagenen applications for both the 2017-2018 academic year and the 2018-2019 academic year. Candidacy is open to all senior neurosurgical residents (PGY6 & PGY7) in approved neurosurgery residency programs and whose intent is to pursue an academic career in neurological surgery.

The William P. Van Wagenen Fellowship includes the following:

- \$120,000 stipend for living and travel expenses to a foreign country for a period of 12 months
- \$6,000 family travel and living allowance if a spouse and/or children will accompany the Fellow
- \$15,000 of research support to the university, hospital or laboratory sponsoring the Fellow
- \$5,000 for medical insurance, if needed

As the premier funder of neurosurgical studies and education, the NREF focuses on providing fellowship funding in basic neuroscience and neurosurgical programs in North America.

The NREF encourages institutions to apply for funding via the **Post-Residency Clinical Fellowship** for clinical neurosurgical fellowships. The NREF is responsible for all aspects of the fellowship grant program, including acceptance, review and approval of fellowship grant applications. The NREF will award fellowship grants based upon established program eligibility criteria and the needs of the requesting institution.

Fully funded fellowship grants will be awarded in the amount of \$75,000 for spine surgery and \$50,000 for all others. Depending on available support, grants may be awarded in lesser amounts. The grant is intended to cover the salary and benefits for the fellow first and some, if not all, related non-salary direct costs. Fellowship funds may not be used for indirect fellowship costs.

The online applications for the Post-Residency Clinical Fellowship and the William P. Van Wagenen Fellowship will be available beginning August 1 via the NREF Online Grant Application Portal.
